Outgoing Chair Pam Spradlin received special award from the commissioners for all of her hard work and dedication. Incoming Chair: Dean Elliot. Most of the committees have not met as of yet. Executive committee had a debrief with commissioners. Moving forward they are planning for a normal fair. However, are prepared to shift gears if there are still significant COVID restrictions in pace. New committee was formed to look at awards to see how to standardize them and make the awards process more efficient. Even after significant donations about \$10k was still not covered by sponsors – Everyone looking for a way to make sure things continue to run smoothly.

- o <u>4-H Re-Enrollment</u>: \$50 enrollment fee and paperwork completed by **December 31**st
 - Returning 4-H Members may reenroll up to March 1st with a \$25 late fee in addition to regular enrollment fee.
 - If a returning 4-H member fails to re-enroll on 4HOnline by March 1st, they will not be eligible to participate in county or state competitions, including the Douglas County Fair & Rodeo.

Conduct

Conduct themselves in a courteous, respectful manner, use appropriate language, exhibit good sportsmanship, and act as positive role models.



Abstain from abuse (physical and/or verbal) and harassment.



Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies, and rules of the facility being used.



Responsibility

HANDS

Accept personal responsibility for behavior including any financial damage.



Be responsible for any financial damage caused by inappropriate behavior.



Fully participate in scheduled activities



HEART Respect

Respect others property and privacy rights.



Respect the rights and authority of parents, leaders and Extension Agents.



Safety


Adhere to principles and rules of safety



Abstain from illegal behaviors, use of alcohol, marijuana, illegal or illicit drugs, and tobacco including e-cigarettes and vaping device during 4-H events and activities

Douglas County 4-H Expectations

- 1. Douglas County Extension Team holds the Colorado 4-H Code of Conduct in the highest regard. Leaders, youth, families, and community partners who are found to be in violation with any points of the code of conduct will first be asked to meet with the Douglas County extension staff. Further consequences for violating any part of this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to: removal from participation in the event in which the code of conduct has been violated (at the individual's expense); sanctions on participating in future 4-H events; forfeiture of financial support for the event; removal from offices held, etc.
- 2. The Douglas County Extension team expects leaders, youth, families, and community partners to all work together towards the vision of Colorado 4-H: A world in which youth and adults learn, grow, and work together. The Douglas County Extension Team expects this to be done by empowering youth to reach their full potential by working and learning in partnership with caring adults.
- 3. The Douglas County Extension team expects all leaders, youth, families, and community partners to embrace the Colorado 4-H policy that all of its programs and activities be offered without discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, or marital or family status.
- 4. The Douglas County Extension team expects all leaders, youth, families, and community partners to work together as a team. As such, we expect small conflicts to be worked out in a timely manner amongst all appropriate parties. If a conflict is not resolved in a way where all parties involved are satisfied the Douglas County Extension team expects the conflict to be brought to their attention. The Douglas County Extension teams expects those involved to present the conflict with a potential reasonable solution.
 - a. Parents & Youth → Leaders
 - i. Project Leaders → Organization Leaders
 - b. Leaders → Extension Agents
 - c. Parents & youth \rightarrow Extension Agent (If they do not feel safe or comfortable approaching leaders)
- 5. The Douglas County Extension team expects all leaders, youth, families, and community partners to treat each other with mutual respect. We understand that not everyone is going to always agree. However, we expect individuals in our 4-H community to work together respectfully.
- 6. The Douglas County Extension team expects all leaders, youth, families, and community partners to always keep the focus of all our effort on positive youth development.

Douglas County 4-H COVID Protocol as of 9/14/2020

(always subject to change)

No one should be meeting in groups face to face without written permission from Agents Kirsten or Nicole.

Even if you received permission to practice this past summer or spring – please re-submit your request for the 2020-2021 4-H year!

Current Policy

- Up to 25 Youth* are permitted in one area at one time
- Instructors (leaders) would <u>NOT</u> be counted to this number
- Parents are also permitted to observe and are <u>NOT</u> counted in the 25 person limit for that area. Parents should maintain 6' of distance at all times
- Youth should maintain their 6' of distance to the greatest extent possible.
- Face masks are currently mandatory while inside and mandatory while outside if 6' of distance cannot be maintained.

<u>Current Exceptions from CSU</u>: Club meetings/small group activities, Horse practices, Dog practices, Livestock practices, and Shooting Sports practices. We can apply for more – Just contact us and we can get going on this!



How to get approval for Face to Face meetings & programming:

- **Step 1** Contact the agent with the information below
 - Leader Name(s)
 - Practice Location address and how social distancing is possible
 - Meeting Schedule/Expected meeting schedule
 - Participant/Expected Participant Numbers Total: (how will you handle if more that 25 want to attend)
 - Expected Participant Attendance
- Step 2 Receive written permission from the agent to hold that meeting, agent will add the information to the exception through CSU, and send you the current rules & regulations for that type of activity.
- **Step 3** Run your program, workshop, training, meeting using best policies as laid out in the exception paperwork. Take attendance of everyone present (including parents, leaders, helpers, siblings, etc.
- **Step 4** Send attendance to agent following the meeting (We as agents need to send monthly updates to campus to cover all face to face programming that is taking place here in Douglas County)
- Step 5 If it is the same type of meting (Example- Weekly dog practice or weekly horse ride nights) list all dates for the exception that you know of and keep agent updated of attendance and any changes that are made, you do NOT have to ask permission for each individual practice. IF you want to run a new or different type of event just send the above info for the new event to the agent and we will get you squared away.

^{*} For larger clubs or clubs that would be interesting in hosting events/activities/meetings/educational workshops with more than 25 youth – please contact the agents and we will work with you to see what we can do! These requests will be taken on a case by case basis and absolutely should not happen without a discussion with the agent.
